


Song of the Bauls

> We must always believe in the possibility of a better world, > And we must always work to create that world.




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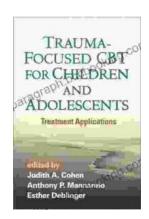
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
